All parents and friends are cordially invited to attend this final meeting. A report of the scholarship fund will be given. Refreshments will be served and a social hour will follow the meeting.

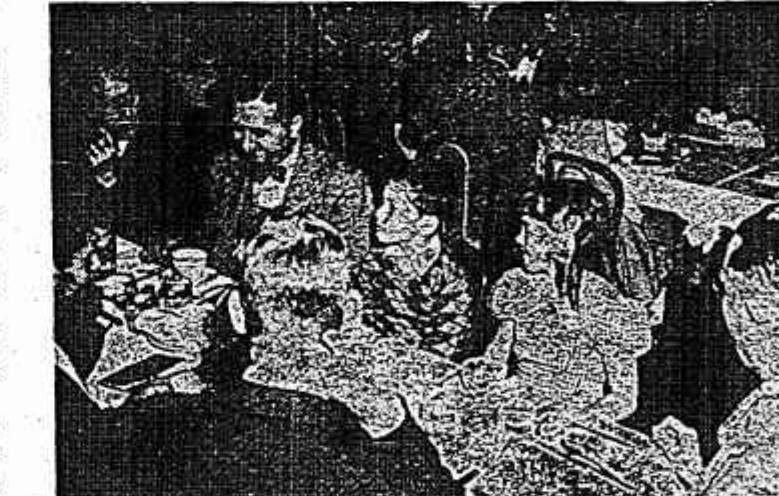

The session would include high school work and review work in the seventh and eighth grades and as such would provide an opportunity for students wishing to earn extra credits, to raise marks in subjects to meet college entrance requirements or to make up subjects failed. High school subjects on the tentative curriculum are languages, social studies and mathematics. Anyone interested, whether a summer or permanent resident of the Mahopac area, is asked to contact school officials as soon as possible. The courses will be given if there is sufficient demand and arrangements will be made to give New York State Regents examinations in subjects covered.

Ucle of Town Clerk Daniel Millicker Succumbs Monday, Aged 88. Funeral Held Wednesday.

William Henry Maher, a life-long resident of the Mahopacs, died on Monday, May 10, 1948, at the Millicker home at Mahopac Falls. His age was 88.

The deceased was a son of William H. and Mary Nolan Maher and was born at Mahopac Falls Feb. 13, 1860. He had been employed as a laborer on local work most of his life and resided at Mahopac until eight years ago when he went to live with his niece and nephew at the Falls. He was unmarried.

Funeral services were held at ten o'clock Wednesday morning at St. John's R. C. church at Mahopac with Father Woods officiating. Interment was made in St. Joseph's cemetery at Somers.
